Attached is the latest version of the SCWS task list. The period between March and July was a busy one at the sanctuary. Many tasks, both indoor and outdoor, were completed. Some tasks came and went without ever being listed.

Thanks to the generosity of **two donors**, there was action on three vital tasks as follows: (1) a new roof was installed by **Hamlet Roofing** during the first week of June. We now no longer fear rainstorms.



(2) Most of the exterior woodwork of the house was either repaired or replaced. We no longer

fear the damage of damp rot or the incursion of critters to places they need not be. (3) **Our neighbour to the South** undertook major improvements to the driveway including much work on the SCWS portion. We no longer lose teeth or car parts getting to the sanctuary. This is not the end of the driveway saga, nevertheless, a great beginning.

Thanks to old experienced hands and to younger strong backs many tasks were completed in the period. A few examples follow. A new sink and insulated wall were put in the back room. The disintegrating brick fireplace was demolished whose base is now the new home of the Buddy doghouse. The decayed West end of the barn was (mostly) removed as was the old style TV tower (who noticed that? If you didn't – advance to the sanctuary and donate \$200). Ventilation in the house was improved, as were working conditions by relocating the washer & dryer to the main floor and moving the dumpster to eliminate the long walk up and down the hill. A technical volunteer has renovated all the mowers, which, due to the excellent grass-growing season, are seeing heavy use.

These are just a few of the tasks done by volunteers and this newsletter takes the opportunity to thank everyone involved in all the tasks and expresses the hope that, in giving your time and effort, you take away some personal satisfaction with what you have contributed.

Do you know that 100% of every donation goes directly to the running of the sanctuary and to provide veterinary care and food for the animals! Speaking of veterinary care --- these costs are generally in the thousands of dollars each month. Other than one employee for the house and one employee for the sanctuary, SCWS is completely volunteer-operated. Unlike many charities, there is no large amount taken out for administration expenses.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

This is the season for kittens and Second Chance has certainly not been left out of this loop. We currently have 26 kittens ranging in age from 3 weeks to 3 months. Thanks to a few very valuable volunteers who are providing foster homes for these kittens (and mothers in some cases), they are healthy and ready to go to their new forever homes.

On one recent Monday morning, one of our shelter workers arrived at work to find two boxes on the driveway. One of these boxes contained three kittens (approximately 4-6 weeks of age) and the second box contained a mother and 7 (approximately one-week-old) kittens. Their owner didn't do the right and proper thing and have the adult animal spayed and then the mistreatment continued by dropping the family on our driveway.

It continues to amaze all of us at Second Chance that so many people feel their animals, especially cats, are disposable. The most frequently heard reason for needing to free themselves of their pets is "we've just had a baby and he/she is allergic to the cat" or "we are moving and animals are not allowed". Their cat is/has been a part of the family long before the baby arrived --- try keeping the cat in one area of the house, vacuuming and dusting more frequently. Chances are the cat was your "baby" before the arrival of the baby daughter or son. I move to a place that wouldn't allow animals – why move and leave some of your family behind?

Second Chance recently took in several cats and received a donation that would not even buy a bag of cat food. We soon found out that two of the cats in this group were pregnant. Then it turned out that the cat could not deliver the babies and a caesarian section was necessary. A caesarian section is not a routine operation and of course resulted in costing the

sanctuary several hundred dollars. Unfortunately, this is not an isolated incident.

Second Chance currently has approximately 200 cats and we very often refer callers requesting help to other rescue organizations. Frequently these people return to Second Chance indicating that other organizations have turned them away indicating that they are “full”. We are often advised that the people have no other option than euthanasia of the animal and so Second Chance always makes room **(although I’m sure that we are just as “full” as any other rescue organization)** in order to spare the animal’s life.

As mentioned in our spring newsletter. **SPCA is now operating a low-cost spay and neuter clinic in New Market. The spay or neuter fee is \$50 for cats and vaccines are \$10 each. Female dogs are \$80 and males are \$60. For more information,** please visit the web site ontariospca.ca.



A large section of one of our previous newsletters was devoted to making our readers aware of this urgent need for property and a permanent home for Second Chance cats and other animals. This is a need that has existed


since Joyce Smith first founded Second Chance in 1996. The sanctuary's mandate is to aid orphaned, sick or injured, and abandoned animals.
