SANCTUARY

Pressures (requests) on rescue organizations to take in cats are constantly increasing. Second Chance is no exception. For every cat that SCWS adopts out there is a request to take in more. For every available space, there are more “space critters” needing help. Accommodating requests to take in cats is not necessarily a matter of physical space; physical space can be made available one way or another. The main space problem is FINANCIAL space. This is what Second Chance is running out of - financial space. By financial space, we mean the dollar donations (hard cash) which pay for food, litter, veterinary costs, heating costs, employees to look after the cat population and very modest, necessary, administration costs. There are no paid Directors, Managers or Supervisors at Second Chance – we don’t have the money – and wouldn’t spend it that way even if we had! (We need volunteers)

When the founder of Second Chance, Joyce Smith, was alive, she had a wide circle of contacts and supporters who donated to Second Chance. Nigh on three years, her presence is still missed. Reviewing our donor records, we see that many individuals and some organizations who generously donated during

Joyce’s time no longer donate. SCWS is now run by a Board of Directors all of whom knew Joyce well and are committed to running SCWS according to the principles she left behind. SCWS is the only rescue that we know of which gives a permanent (inside) home to feral cats and FIV cats.

We urge (plead to) all former donors to resume donating to SCWS – the rationale is as valid as ever and the need has not decreased. Joanne’s prize is a one year supply of Purina pet food. As Joanne’s cats are fed veterinarian food, Joanne is giving the coupons for this food to the shelter.

In one of our previous newsletters, we asked animal lovers to visit the sanctuary on a regular basis and to choose a cat they would care for. Meaning – brush, clip nails, pet and give attention. After visiting once a week regularly and spending only 10 or 20 minutes with one, two, or more cats, you will soon find your “chosen cat” will respond to your voice and come forward to greet you. AND you will benefit too – you will find this time to be relaxing and stress-free!

Thoughts are turning to spring and summer and all the duties that come with the nice weather. We will be having another grounds cleanup day on April 30 --- please plan on joining us. We are hoping to make some improvements to the sanctuary during the warm weather, so please visit the sanctuary and complete a volunteer information sheet so that we can contact you.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

We continue to receive many calls about cats on the street and it makes us feel incredibly sad that we cannot take these cats. But, unfortunately, Second Chance is full and the most we can do is to ensure that these cats are neutered and release them for some kind person to feed them or, if one of them is lucky, some one may provide him/her with a home.

We have trapped several cats on the sanctuary grounds – some of these cats are neutered and obviously have had a home. These cats have been left on the sanctuary grounds. Do people not realize what their cats are faced with when they drop them on the sanctuary grounds? The coyotes are hungry at any time but especially when everything is covered with snow. It is so painful when these cats are caught, their trust has been broken – some cower in the cage, others lash out – it may be months (if ever) before we see the true personality of these cats.

As mentioned in other newsletters, if people MUST drop off their cats, it would be very beneficial to provide the name, age, date of last vaccines and identify any health problem.

As mentioned in our previous newsletters, **SPCA is now operating a low-cost spay and neuter clinic in Newmarket. The spay or neuter fee is \$50 for cats and vaccines are \$10 each. Female dogs are \$80 and males are \$60. For more information,** please visit the web site www.ontariospca.ca.

Although we no longer provide care for wildlife, we still provide assistance to people in need of help with wild animals by providing

REMEMBERING

FIGARO

Figaro was one of our long-time residents who went to his new home in August. Figaro, from all reports, thrived in his new home, fit in well with the existing cats and was greatly loved by the family. After a couple of months, Figaro's appetite decreased and the diagnosis was bad teeth. Dental surgery was done but Figaro's recovery was not good and the vet suspected a tumour. Figaro was cared for and nursed by his family until the end when he lost his fight. How sad and unfair to Figaro!

GIMPY

Gimpy never made it to the sanctuary. When the person who rescued Gimpy brought him to the sanctuary in November, 2010 and realized we had no room, she agreed to foster him. The lady who brought Gimpy to us worked in real estate and had noticed Gimpy in the fenced back yard of one of the houses she was showing. The lady also noticed many empty cat food cans in the yard which gave the impression that neighbours/people in the area had been throwing cans of cat food into the yard for him. It is a mystery how Gimpy got in that fenced back yard in view of his disability. You see, when Gimpy was taken to the vet, it was discovered that he had only three legs, the fourth was just a stump which did not appear to have been surgically severed. The vet indicated that Gimpy had stomach trouble – perhaps FIP – and did not think he would live long. However, Gimpy's rescuer kept Gimpy to the very end – only about three weeks. Gimpy seemed to enjoy the warmth, security, and care

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provided to him and would “drag” himself over to her side for petting and attention. Sad that a cat in Gimpy’s condition was left out alone – WHERE WERE HIS OWNERS?

IVERS

Ivers was a new arrival in the early fall of 2010. The family who had been feeding him called Second Chance for help as they thought “the stray” had an injured jaw. Of course, we agreed to take the cat – named him Ivers and sent him to the vet for a check up. Ivers’ jaw problem was an abscess which was treated. Ivers was neutered and became a resident of the sanctuary. Ivers was doing well at the sanctuary until one day, he developed a problem with his breathing which became very labored, he was taken to the vet who provided oxygen immediately. However, despite the emergency treatment, Ivers died within minutes of his arrival. An autopsy showed that Ivers had heart trouble.

MENTE

Mente was estimated to be 10 when he arrived at the sanctuary five years ago. Mente and his friend/sibling were found in the basement of a house – their family had moved and left them behind! Mente had been diagnosed with hyperthyroid and kidney problems a couple of year ago. Mente received his medication daily and limped along for a couple of years but in November his appetite decreased substantially, he got very weak and was not able to walk around the sanctuary. In a period of one week, Mente lost more than one pound. A volunteer brought him home so he could get extra attention but our last vet visit brought the news we didn’t want to hear – Mente was suffering and it was time ...

DONATIONS

Do you know that 100% of every donation goes directly to sanctuary activities. SCWS Directors are not paid. There are no paid staff other than those who directly handle and care for the animals. SCWS does not pay fundraisers. SCWS does not make investments or lend money. Administrative expenses consist of things for which we are charged, for example, phone, cable, bank charges, mailing costs.

Thus, donations to SCWS are used for the expenses of keeping the buildings operating, food, veterinary expenses and, as just noted, ordinary admin costs. Veterinary expense is a very large item (burden) usually running to several thousand dollars per month.

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When you donate to SCWS, your money goes directly to the welfare and care of the animals. It is spent carefully and responsibly just as you would want it to be.

If you are already a donor, please consider increasing your donation; if not, please consider becoming a donor.

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CANDY DISPENSING PROGRAM

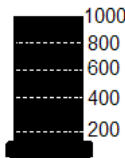

BRING US YOUR LOONIES/PENNIES

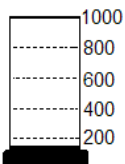
